COURSE OUTLINE

Theatre Arts 110 (C-ID Number: THTR 175) **Stage Makeup II (C-ID Title: Stage Makeup)**

I. **Catalog Statement**

Theatre Arts 110 is a continuation of Theatre Arts 109 with emphasis on special effects using prosthetics, facial hair and wigs. The course builds upon the basic stage makeup taught in Stage Makeup I with a focus on special effects that significantly change the actor for the purpose of performance. This is an introduction to potential career paths for students interested in makeup design.

II. **Course Entry Expectations**

- 1. analyze an actor's features and select appropriate colors and corrective techniques;
- 2. interpret a production through makeup design
- 3. mix colors for desired results;
- 4. change an actor's appearance for a given role;
- 5. evaluate character to determine how make-up can accentuate personality traits.
