Administration of Justice 130 Law Enforcement Supervision and Management

Administration of Justice 130 provides an overview of the basic concepts, problems, issues, and concerns of a contemporary police organization. There are four major areas the course will examine and evaluate: the preparation of the individual officer for future promotional examinations, the current major police supervisory principles and ideologies, the proven techniques and skills required in the practice of sound supervision in police service, and a survey of management theory.
