Italian 101 Beginning Italian I

ITAL 101 teaches the fundamentals of Italian grammar. Students are trained to pronounce Italian correctly, to acquire a small working vocabulary which they use in conversation and writing, and to read simple Italian.

Note: This course is not intended for students with oral proficiency or who have attended schools where Italian was the language of instruction.

Course Entry Expectations

Prior to enrolling in the course, the student should be able to:

- analyze short essays (at least five paragraphs in length) to identify thesis, topic development and concluding sentences, as well as traditional expressions used to increase coherence;
- evaluate compositions for unity, and sufficiency of development, and coherence, as well as variety of sentence structure;
- organize and write a thesis-driven, organized essay which is at least three paragraphs in length (paragraphs should have a topic sentence and at least five additional sentences which further develop that topic sentence with explanations or examples. These sentences must be in logical order and be connected by transitional expressions, where appropriate. Paragraphs must be tied together by appropriate transitions or other devices which provide cohesion.);
- use in their essays a variety of sentence types with minimal errors in such basics of the sentence as subject-verb agreement, subordination, and complementation.

- recognize and apply Italian language pronunciation rules at an introductory level;
- communicate in Italian, both orally and in writing, using basic vocabulary for themes, such as:
 - a. greetings, salutations and introductions;
 - b. obtaining information;
 - c. describing themselves, expressing personal feelings, likes and dislikes;
 - d. describing people, places and things;
 - e. navigating through a menu of an Italian restaurant, and ordering food;
- read and comprehend Italian at an introductory level;
- use grammatically correct Italian to discuss or write about topics in the present and simple past tenses;
- compare and contrast the Italian culture with his/her own.
