Spanish 101 (C-ID Number: SPAN 100) Beginning Spanish I (C-ID: Elementary Spanish I)

Catalog Statement

SPAN 101 teaches the fundamentals of Spanish grammar in a cultural context. Students are trained to utilize correct pronunciation in Spanish, to acquire a small working vocabulary which they use in conversation and writing, and to read simple Spanish. The class is taught primarily in Spanish.

Course Entry Expectations

Prior to enrolling in the course, the student should be able to:

- analyze short essays (at least five paragraphs in length) to identify thesis, topic development and concluding sentences, as well as traditional expressions used to increase coherence;
- evaluate compositions for unity, and sufficiency of development, and coherence, as well as variety of sentence structure;
- organize and write a thesis driven, organized essay which is at least three paragraphs in length (paragraphs should have a topic sentence and at least five additional sentences which further develop that topic sentence and at least five additional sentences which further develop that topic sentence with explanations or examples. These sentences must be in logical order and be connected by transitional expressions, where appropriate. Paragraphs must be tied together by appropriate transitions or other devices which provide cohesion);
- use in their essays a variety of sentence types with minimal errors in such basics of the sentence as subject-verb agreement, subordination, and complementation.

- communicate in Spanish, both orally and in writing, using basic vocabulary for expressing personal feelings;

- demonstrate knowledge of the culture of Spanish-speaking countries and compare and contrast the Spanish culture with his/her own culture.
