### **2014 GCC FOOTBALL:** A SEASON TO REMEMBER

The Glendale College football team did not win a championship or a bowl game in 2014 but it may have achieved a greater victory than one or both of those accomplishments could have provided.

By going 9-1 during the 2014 regular season before falling to a strong Palomar team 30-22 in the Patriotic Bowl Nov. 22, the Vaqueros completed a two-year stretch where they finished 15-6 in 2013-14. They not only gained the respect of their opponents but themselves as a program on the rise as their statistics and post season honors would show.

Simply put, the 2014 Vaqueros were a force on both sides of the ball and their No. 4 ranking in the Pacific Conference of the American Division shows that. Defensively, Glendale ranked as the No. 1 defense in the state where 69 schools platy football and No. 1 in several categories throughout Southern California including points allowed, yards

allowed, interceptions as well as fumble recoveries, sacks and touchdowns scored on defense.

Defensive back Dante Shipman earned All-American honors with eight interceptions for the Vags and sent a new school record with 14 over his two years at Glendale and defensive lineman David Smith was named Pacific League American Division Defensive Player of the year

as well as Region IV Defensive Player of the Year.

Offensively, the Vaqs were closely balanced between the run and the pass but led the conference in several rushing categories including rushing attempts, touchdowns, rushing first downs and also ranked first in fourth down conversions in which they converted 50 percent of their attempts.

Sophomore running back Marquise McGuire finished his career with 1,734yards rushing and also earned All-Western State Conference First Team and All-Region IV honors for the second consecutive season.

All told, the 2014 football season goes down as one of the best ever in school history and will be something to build on for the Vaqueros for years to come.

To look at Sartoris Field and watch a game under the lights and see the sun set in a perfect setting for football, it is hard to believe that the program at Glendale Community College got started way back in 1928 and has grown to what it is today over 80 years later. The Vagueros resplendent in cardinal and gold and one of the preeminent programs in the state based not only on longevity but also for the players who made up the team's ands the men who coached them.

"Once a Vaq, always a Vaq" is not just a cliché statement but more of a reminder that when you play football for the Vaqueros, you are part of a family at Glendale College that will always be there for you years after player have moved on with their lives. Since 1972 when Jim Sartoris took over as head coach, only three men have assumed that title counting John Cicuto from 1989-2007 and John Rome from 2008 to the present. That also means that on almost any day, a former Vaq could walk in the football office and he his team picture on a wall and see a coach still part of the staff and recall the good old days.

While the program at Glendale values wins and losses and championships as much as any other team in the state, the true value of playing for the Vaqueros or any of the 16 teams that make up athletics at the college is that academics come first and the term student-athlete is taken very seriously. To wear a Glendale College football uniform is not just about being a football player with different skill sets but to be able to handle the academic rigors of taking transferable classes five days a week in the mornings, being accountable to attend meetings and practice in the afternoons and then possibly work a job in the evenings.

Since 1928, literally thousands of young men have strapped on their helmets to represent Glendale College on the gridiron but certainly a handful have reached the goal of not only transferring and earning a degree and playing for a four-year school but making it to the National Football League as a player or coach. Currently Andy Reid, who played for the Vags in 1976 and 1977, took over as the head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs in 2013 and lead them to the playoffs after 14 years in Philadelphia. He counts his Glendale experience as one of the most important of his life.
