Students will receive priority registration and work with a Student Equity Counselor who is familiar with the challenges and needs of Foster Youths. - GCC's Black Scholars (African-AmericanTransfer Student Program, GCC's Black Scholars)
 Assists African American college students in realizing and achieving their academic and
 career goals by increasing the retention, persistence, and graduation rates of its members.
 We provide students with a variety of support services: Academic counseling, tutoring,
 mentoring, cultural and university field trips, pre-registration workshops, book loans,
 scholarships, and learning communities.
- La Comunidad (Latina and Latino Transfer Student Program)
 Works with the Latino/a student population to obtain an Associate degree(s) (A.A./A.S/A.A.T/ or A.S.T) and help them transfer to a university. We provide students with a personal Student Equity Counselor, peer mentorship, tutoring services, college tours, cultural enrichment activities, registration and transfer-related assistance, and potential school supplies. This program requires a minimum of a 2.7 GPA and the desire to obtain a higher education.

Summer Bridge

All the above programs are collaborating jointly to offer students the opportunity to participate in the Summer Bridge Program. The benefits of the Summer Bridge Program are that students will receive Math and English assessment preparation. Additionally, students will be able to enroll in our Freshmen Seminar, which will cover essential topics on transitioning into college, understanding your educational options, and developing important skills for success. Students will be paired with a "Spark" peer mentor, who will offer additional support and guidance throughout the summer semester.
