Alcohol/Drug Studies 150 provides students with an opportunity to observe and evaluate Alcoholics Anonymous and several other self-help groups involved in the treatment of alcohol/drug dependency and related disorders. Alcoholics Anonymous is studied as the foundation or blueprint for emerging self-help groups. The "Twelve Steps" of Recovery from Alcoholics Anonymous are studied from both a psychological and self-help perspective.
