*Course Description

English 120 "Composition and Reading" is designed for students who want to prepare for the writing required in college classes and other settings. The course emphasizes practice in the writing of thesis-based essays and the critical analysis of selected prose works dealing with important contemporary ideas. English 120 provides practice in the mechanics, style and organization of paragraphs and essays.

Prerequisite: English 191 (may be taken concurrently) or placement based on a composite of test scores and academic background.

You must have all materials by the second day of class, or you will be marked as absent for that day. If you do not have the materials by the third day of class, you will be dropped.

Class Policies

Writing: Over the course of the session, you will complete approximately five 750-1000 word essays and one longer, (approximately 1,500 word), research paper, covering a variety of topics associated with the readings. These essays will be a combination of inclass assignments and homework, and will result in your writing six thousand words; they will demonstrate your understanding and ability to apply critical thinking, analysis and literary theory.

<u>Reading</u>: Assigned reading from the text and other sources will be outlined on the course schedule. A reading assignment mentioned in the schedule should be completed by the date on the schedule, ready for discussion on that date.

<u>Quizzes and Exams</u>: Quizzes will be administered periodically throughout the session; a midterm will be administered in October, and your research paper will count as your final

essay exam. A cumulative quiz score of less than 50% at the end of the session will result in a loss of credit for the course.

<u>Grading</u>: In order to receive credit for this class, students <u>must complete</u> all assigned work, display sufficient mastery of writing, composition, analytical and theoretical skills as outlined in the course overview.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

All papers must be in accordance with MLA format. No late work will be accepted.

Neither quizzes nor the final exam may be made-up, except in the event of an excused absence.

I will endeavor to return graded work within ten days of submission.

All assigned reading must be completed before the scheduled discussion. Note that your active and thoughtful participation in discussions and exercises will be an important consideration in determining your grade.

Library Workshops: You must attend 3 library workshops by November 5th 2008. Your attendance record will be sent to me automatically. Attendance of these three workshops accounts for a percentage of your final grade.

Absences: You will be dropped from the class, or receive a failing grade for the course if:

- 1. you are absent any day during the first week of class

Tardiness (includes returning late from a class break or leaving early): You will receive the following penalties for tardiness:
