#### I. Catalog Statement

English 186 - Basic Reading Lab - 1 unit

Prerequisite: Placement is based on a composite of test scores and academic background.

English 186 is an individualized course of study designed to improve a student's English reading skills. The course covers reading techniques, vocabulary development, and comprehension and analysis skills.

Laboratory: 3 hours per week

#### II. Objectives

The student will be able to:

- 1. score at a third-grade level on a standardized reading test.
- 2. apply word attack and reading strategies to improve comprehension of reading selections.
- 3. answer comprehension, analysis, synthesis, and application questions based on a simple reading selection.
- 4. analyze data presented in diagrams, charts, graphs, and other graphic formats.
