What is DACA?

- DACA is a federal government program created in 2012 under Barack Obama to allow people brought to the US illegally as children the temporary right to live, study and work in America.
- Those applying are vetted for any criminal history or threat to national security and must be students or have completed school or military service.
- If they pass vetting, action to deport them is deferred for two years, with a chance to renew, and they become eligible for basics like a driving license, college enrollment or a work permit.

Background

- Those protected under DACA are referred to as "Dreamers"
- Currently, there are almost 800,000 Dreamers or DACA recipients
- On September 5th the Trump Administration issued a memo stating they would be ending the DACA program within 6 months (March 2018)
- The future of the Dreamers is very precarious. We do not know if they will be located and deported after the program is terminated or if Congress will find a solution before that.
- These students are currently experiencing great distress, anxiety and fear for both themselves but also their families (who can be located due to the documentation submitted by DACA applicants).
- This presentation is intended to provide campus faculty and staff with guidelines about what to do if ICE comes onto campus to locate and/or remove undocumented and/or DACA students

What to do if ICE comes into your classroom or office

- Please do not provide ANY student information to ICE
- Do not allow ICE to identify undocumented students or make students comply with any of their orders in your class or office
- Direct ICE officers to the President's office
- Chief of GCC Police, Gary Montecuollo, has stated that if ICE comes onto campus after the President has left faculty/staff should call the GCC police station to have ICE escorted away so they do not disrupt class or engage with students

GCC's Current Commitment

- Excerpt from GCC President Dr. David Viar's September 5th Statement in response to the Trump Administration's Memo on DACA
 - GCC is open to all students who meet minimum requirements for admission, regardless of immigration status.
 - GCC will not release any personal identifiable student information related to immigration status, without a judicial warrant, subpoena or court order, unless authorized by the student or required by law.
 - The college police department will not detain, question, or arrest any individual solely on the basis of (suspected) undocumented immigration status. [GCC] College Police Immigration Policy)
 - GCC will not cooperate with any federal effort to create a registry of individuals based on any protected characteristics such as religion, nation of origin, race, gender, or sexual orientation.
