English 188 Introduction to Academic Reading

Catalog Statement

ENGL 188 is a reading course designed for students who need to improve their basic reading comprehension skills. Various word attack skills are covered: syllabication/phonics, word analysis through the study of prefixes, suffixes, and word roots. Basic grammar rules regarding parts of speech, punctuation and capitalization are reviewed. Methods and strategies to improve comprehension, application, and analysis are examined, along with Know-Will Know-Learn (KWL)Survey-Question-Read- Recite-Review (SQ3R), highlighting, outlining and summarizing in order to differentiate between general and specific details, and determine the topic and main ideas in paragraphs.
