




Student Preparation Based on Placement

Math Preparation Based on Placement




Math Placement by School







Units Attempted by School Fall 2018



Conclusions

GUSD Students:

- Represent 41% of incoming high school graduates at GCC.
- Based on placement, are significantly better prepared in math and English than the overall incoming high school population.
- Are focused overwhelmingly on transfer with a significant undecided population.
- Attempt slightly more units than the overall incoming high school population.
- Have overall course success rates that are significantly higher than the overall incoming high school population.






GCC DUAL ENROLLMENT STUDENT NUMBERS




GCC DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSES OFFERED AT GUSD HIGH SCHOOLS



GCC DUAL ENROLLMENT STUDENT NUMBERS BY HIGH SCHOOL




GCC Dual Enrollment-Daily High School

EARLY COLLEGE ACADEMY - IGETC PATHWAY

- Three year program (10th 12th grade)
- 70-80 student in cohort
- The pathway is built into high school master schedule
- Students will complete 45 units in the program
- Students have the opportunity to complete beyond the 45 units through summer sessions, winter session, or through afterschool dual enrollment program
 - This student could be transfer-ready
 - This could lead to an AA/AS Transfer degree
- A-G and high school graduation requirements are still being met




