### **Art 179 Portfolio Presentation for Studio Artists**

#### **Catalog Statement**

ART 179 is an intermediate studio art course that assists students with preparation of a professional quality fine-art portfolio for use in transfer, exhibition, or employment. Students will refine and develop a coherent body of artwork that reflects their technical skills, creativity, and style. Students also learn to write artist statements and artist resumes, document their work in photographic and digital form, and sharpen their presentation skills.

#### **Course Entry Expectations**

Prior to enrolling in the course, the student should be able to:

- synthesize the primary concepts of design by completing a series of projects in various two-dimensional art media such as paper, paint, pencil, and ink;
- develop solutions to assignments incorporating the critical elements of design such as line, shape, space, texture, value, and color;
- demonstrate an understanding of basic color concepts preliminary to future study of formal color theory;
- evaluate the aesthetic merits of their works through class discussion and critique finished projects and works in progress;
- establish an awareness of the relationship between the principles of design (such as unity, variety, balance, emphasis, rhythm, proportion, and scale) and the elements of design;
- evaluate the various methods of presentation of artwork including matting and portfolio;
- use the primary concepts, skills, and appreciations applicable to drawing.

#### **Introduction and Overview (7 lecture hours, 4 lab hours)**

#### **Portfolio Review, Group Critique, Individual Consultations (7 lecture hours, 4 lab hours)**

- Clarification of student's professional goals
- Development of new material
- Redevelopment of "old" material to a professional level
- Arrangement of material into an appropriate professional format

#### **Artist Statements (7 lecture hours, 4 lab hours)**

- Discussion of preparing an artist statement
- Research for artist statement
- Comparisons of artist statements for different professional purposes

#### **Presentations and Resumes (7 lecture hours, 4 lab hours)**

- Discussion of presentation methods: studio visits, interviews, slide sub-mission, and online applications
- Discussion of juries: transfer visits, portfolio review, and juried exhibitions
- Preparation of oral presentations for art professionals
- Preparation of artist resumes
- Differentiation of artist resumes from other resumes

#### **Documentation of Art Work (7 lecture hours, 4 lab hours)**

- Photography for slide presentation
- Photography for digital presentation

#### **Presentation Practice (5 lecture hours, 4 lab hours)**

- written exercises; (e.g. a personal written artist's statement).
