Introduction to Glendale Community College:

The Journalism Program at GCC:

- The required Journalism Student Publications Staff course is taught by its faculty advisor, Dr. Cohen.
- Students venture into varied journalistic publications and productions, putting together newspapers, magazines, podcasts, and more.

Either a seminar or an info session is held once every academic semester.
