Within my position, I was limited in what I could do, and would see counselors and what they were able to do. Encouraged by my counseling colleagues to pursue my Master's, I left my classified position and started the San Diego State Multicultural Community Counseling Program as part of a cohort of 27 students of diverse backgrounds.

My Advice for Younger Generations: I'm not a science or math person, and felt these were my crosses throughout college. I always had to really, really apply myself with these subjects.
